# THE FEBRUARY MEETING

Our February meeting was a big success. Although no official records exist, comments were made that we had set a record attendance. We had about 125 people with standing room only. About a dozen new members were signed up and with two wood shows in town since we last met, we had plenty of visitors as well. It should be noted the coffee and cookies never ran out. Thanks Ladies!

Our featured speaker was Chris Schwarz, Executive Editor of Popular Woodworking Magazine. Chris admits to having the perfect job. With an education in journalism and an avid woodworker since the age of 11, he believes his position working in the woodworking publishing business is



the best of both worlds.

Chris spent the first hour talking about how tool testing is done and fielded a continuous flow of questions from the membership. Chris

was refreshingly frank about his likes and dislikes mentioning brand names when needed. One question was asked about possible bias between advertisers and tool test results. Chris mentioned that he felt the testing was done without bias. Manufactures whose products had literally gone up in smoke were generally given the opportunity to provide another sample, but the original problem was mentioned in the subsequent tool report. He indicated that if there was any bias at all it might be in the actual selection of which manufacturers were selected to be tested. I believe the membership could have continued the tool questions all day.

Questioning was cut off so Chris could share some techniques on sharpening plane irons that he learned about on a recent trip to England. His tips described how to shorten the time to flatten the back of a plane iron and how to quickly put a very slight convex curve in the plane blade edge. Both methods were done with a cheep steel ruler and its plastic case. I am sorry that I can not share the details here. It is much easier to see than to describe in print. Feedback on Chris's presentation was very positive. Chris also welcomed the opportunity to return. {Cont'd on page #3}

#### **Decorative Flocking**

For my wife's Christmas present, I decided to build a jewelry box with a drawer. At first I thought the exposed wood grain would dress up the inside of the drawer. But seeing it finished, I decided I needed a softer texture. The only problem was that the drawer and dividers were fully assembled and finished. What could I do? The solution to my problem was a product called Suede-Tex. Suede-Tex isn't a fabric. It's made from whiskersize sprinkles of rayon fabric. After it's applied it looks just like fabric lining. And, lucky for me, decorative flocking should be applied *after* a project is finished. So that's what I used in my drawer. It's easy to apply. First, carefully "paint" the area you want to cover with an adhesive. Suede-Tex makes adhesives that match the different colors of fibers they sell. Some oil based enamels may work as an adhesive, too. Just be careful to put the adhesive only where you want the flocking. While the adhesive is still wet, you'll need to blow the fibers on with a pump-like applicator. You can also use a kitchen strainer or sifter to spread the fibers. After the flocking has been applied, let everything dry overnight. Then dump out the excess fibers.

The whole process is a lot easier than lining a drawer with real fabric, and the end result looks great. You can get decorative flocking and all the stuff that goes with it from mail order sources, woodworking stores, and some craft shops.

#### Miter Gauge Setup Jig

I used to spend quite a bit of time adjusting my miter gauge and testing the setup. Now I have a simple jig that allows me to quickly and accurately set the miter gauge to both 90° and C, see photo.

To make the setup jig, all you need is a scrap piece of plywood. (Mine was 8" x 12".) The first thing to do with this piece is to rip both sides so they're parallel.

Next, cut one end of the jig at 90° and cut the other end at 45°. These cut must be accurate, so take your time. After all, if they're off, even slightly, then your miter gauge will always be off, and the jig won't be much help.

When the ends are cut, all that's left to do is to cut two grooves sized to hold the bar. of your miter gauge. (I made mine 1/4" deep.) Cut one groove on each face, offsetting them so as not to create a weak point in the jig. I cut two grooves so that you can set the jig to a 45° angle in either direction. To set the jig to 90°, simply use the square end.
