Shawn's tips on sealing, staining, glazing and applying top coats of finish have taken some of the mystery out of how we can achieve a first class finish job on our next project or repair. I thought that it was interesting that a perfect finish, especially on an older

piece, is one that isn't perfect—it shows wear and patina in areas of use or places missed by the dust rag over the years.

Shop tours are underway at the time of this writing and will be discussed in the May 12<sup>th</sup> meeting. A special thanks goes out to those of you who opened up your shops to us, prepared them for our visit, and shared your woodworking experience and ideas. Dave Wolhwend did a fine job getting everything organized and printing maps for us. Thank you, Dave.

There were many new faces at Ron's this time. Over twenty people showed up with hand tools ready to add to their woodworking skills. The project was a frame that has been used as a test for new apprentices in the woodworking trade for over 80 years. The nine joints included in this frame are miter butt, miter butt with dowels, saddle joint, ½ lap 90°, ½ lap dove tail, through tenon, mid-half lap, running tenon with draw bore, and a pocket screw joint (which replaced a blind mortise).

With the only power tool being used, a drill, one could close their eyes and be transported back in time. With the only sounds heard is that of chisels, handsaws, and hand planes.

Everyone who attended had a great time and we hope will continue to develop their hand skills. Ron and I would like to see your completed frames at the next meeting so please bring them in. Pictures on bottom of page 4.

As I slowly pulled down the long gravel driveway, a glimpse of something caused me to turn my head quickly to the right. It was then I was able to confirm my sanity for sitting not more than 20 feet from me was one peacock and two peahens. As I set there admiring their beauty, the man I came to see walked around the corner and introduced himself.

My meeting of Gene King came about through a suggestion from Chuck Grimes, and Chuck, I was not disappointed. Gene has been a member of WOCO for a few years but has been cutting and selling wood for over 40 years. Along with that, he farms over 100 acres, and he and his son have a collection of antique tractors to work on in his <u>spare time</u>?

Originally, Gene started cutting on an antique circular saw mill with a 52" blade. Although it is no longer under power it is still intimidating to look at (I believe it would give anyone from OSHA nightmares). However now a days he uses one of two band mills. The first is an American, made in Zanesville, Ohio. This mill will cut up to 34" diameter logs, 20' long. The smaller one is a Hudson that is used on 18" and smaller diameter logs.
